
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ANTONIO MONTERO aka MATEO INDEFENDENT FUR TRADER

According to Fray Angelico Chavez's New Names in New Mexico 1820-1850 pub. 1957, Antonio Montero was born Cporto, Portugal, the son of Jose Scarez Montero and Ana Maria Manuela Montero. Antonio Montero/Matec is

cited by Allan Carpenter in his history Wyoming, New Enchantment of America pub. 1979, as establishing the first real trading post in what is now Wyoming. The post referred to as Fort Antone or Portuguese Houses was erected in the Middle Fork of Powder River near the present-day Kaycee.

An independent fur-trader, Montero/Mateo, one of a special breed of men who challenged the wilderness and survived, played a role in the opening of the West. He dealt primarily in beaver, the dominant fur since the 1600's when it became fashionable to wear the beaver hatmade of fur felt with a nap of beaver hair which could be brushed to gleam like silk. The New England supply of beaver and furs





had almost exterminated.

From Fort Antone (Portuguese Houses) Montero led brigades of fifty men out into the field of trapping. The post was also used as storage for the Eritish Hudson's Bay Fur Company.

North of Montero's post along the Platte River, some thirty years later, Azorean-born John Phillips was to make his 237-mile ride of fame through a freezing blizzard from Ft. Phil Kearny to Fort Laramie to seek aid for the military encampment at Ft. Phil Kearny fearing more attacks from the Sioux. (Bulletin Board-Spring-Summer Issue 1981 Vol. II No. 2.)

In the late thirties and early forties, the Rocky Mountain arena was in the throws of phasing out the beaver trapping and trading for the demand for beaver in the hat making industry had diminished.

Montero surfaced in northern New Mexico where on August 9, 1841 he wed Maria Francisca Vigil. From this union there were two issues, Maria Paul born February 6, 1843 and Antonio born May 25, 1845.

The rivalry between major and small fur-trading companies interested in monopolizing the fur industry was fraught with unfavorable episodes which may have led to

Montero's shadowy disappearance from the area to once again head further westward seeking new horizons.

On May 4, 1984, Frofessor Rogers wrote a letter to me, mailing a very rare book on a Dabney, Louis Dabney. He, Rogers wrote always in Fortuguese and he said in his letter (I will try a translation):

The book on Lewis S. Dabney is a very rare book and Dabney was born in Horta. This copy is a gift to you and, as you will see, was the copy of George Amory.

When Lewis Dabney died, a newspaper in Boston wrote: Mrs. Dabney was the daughter of the late Judge George Tyler Bigelow and an older sister of Mrs. George Amory.

So, the Dabneys (they lived eighty years in Fayal, Pico and Terceira) met the Amorys in New England with family ties.

Amory changed the name in Terceira to Amorim: The same thing happened to the Dabneys. The Dabneys were in France Daubigny. They went from France to America and then to the Azores from 1807 to 1892.

Massachusetts took state censuses every two years from 1855 to . 1945, but original population returns exist only for 1855 and 1865.

These two censuses are currently being published town by town. Each volume contains both the 1855 and 1865 censuses for the town, transcribed in original order, followed by an index of heads of household and persons of other surnames in the household. For a brochure of available towns and their prices, send a business size SASE to Ann S. Lainhart, P. O. Box 1487, Boston, MA 02117.

One of the unusual features of the Massachusetts state censuses is that the enumerators in several towns entered specific town of birth instead of just state or country. In some cases this is only for those born in Massachusetts or in the United States, but in other towns it may include county, parish, or town of birth in other countries. Also it may be only one enumerator out of two or three within a particular town that did this.

There were twenty-two towns in 1855 and ninety-six in 1865. Other States to be Continued.....

TAGGED GIRL OF NINE, WHO TRAVELS 3500 MILES, MOST UNIQUE EXPRESS PACKAGE

Tagged and numbered like a parcel with her name and the names of consignee and sender marked on a slip of pasteboard attached to her



wrist, Jorgina Ajuiar, a diminutive Portuguese maiden of nine years, has, by her arrival in the city of Fall River, Massachusetts, completed what is believed to be the longest journey ever made alone by a child of her age, a journey of about 3500 miles.

With only the address of her father to direct the score of railroad officials, hotel keepers, street car conductors, express companies and ship captains and stewards who might have to assist the little human package to her destination, this child knowing no other language but Portuguese thus came from her home near Lisbon to Massachusetts in safety by train and steamship.

A Popular Traveler

Few of the hundreds however, who did their part towards assuring Senorita Ajuiar's safe arrival in a strange country realized that the events which necessitated such a journey, were the same which compelled Manuel, her King, the young monarch of Portugal to recently leave his native land.

Antonio Ajuiar, the father of the child, was in Portugal about a year ago. With the return to the United States with one of his .

sons, he left Jorgina promising to come for her in another year since the mother was devoted to the grandparents of the child and would not leave until the entire family could come to America together.

Shortly after Mr. Ajuiar came to this country the trouble between loyalists and revolutionists began to break out. Whole villages were plundered, citizens were shot and terror and unrest prevailed.

In the course of the skirmishing, however, at the driving out of King Manuel, the grandfather of the family, and its principal support, was killed.

The shock of her father's death and the additional labors that were put on the mother's shoulders were too much for the latter. About two months ago, she was taken sick and after a few days illness died leaving young Jorgina alone.

The father was notified of what had happened and asked what should be done with his little daughter. He at once replied that she must be sent to him. Since there was no one to come after her and no one to make the trip with her, he determined to make arrangements with the steamship companies and trust to luck.

Senorita Ajuiar was getting ready for her long journey, her bag was packed and addressed and she was taken by relatives and put on the liner at Ponta Delgada with all the instructions for her care and disposal when she should reach America.

The little girl made the trip on the White Star liner Canopic. She was a cabin passenger. Instead of being neglected, the child was one of the centers of attraction during the whole trip. Only a few of the passengers spoke Portuguese but everyone knew the child's story and she received every possible attention.

Many clothes and candy were regular contributions from the passengers. The small Senorita learned how to say "Thank you" but that was the only English that was necessary. Steward, Captain and every official on the liner together with all the passengers united to make the child's trip comfortable.

Upon arriving in Boston, however, the father was not in time to meet her. The arrival of the Canopic a day earlier than was expected resulted in the child's detention at Long Wharf while the officials got into communication with Mr. Ajuiar in Fall River. Jorquina spent the night here. Her father arrived the next day and took her to her new home.

In Fall River she is in the midst of a Portuguese settlement and is already a favorite. You speak like I do but I am from Portugal.----

Figure 3 shows an ancestry chart for a selected individual and Figure 4 shows a descendancy chart for an individual. The number following the name is the **RIN** and can be removed from the chart if desired.

Computer Corner (cont.)

In addition to these standard charts, one can focus on a selected list of people. The Focus List in Figure 5 contains everyone whose name is Smith or Williams. The Focus feature of PAF is a very powerful and useful tool. For instance, in a very large database of several thousand people, it can be very tedious to locate groups of individuals who match a specific set of criteria. As an example, one could make a list of all males born between 1845 and 1860 in the state of Virginia and whose last name was Smith. Imagine the time it would take to do that from a printed list! The Focus feature can also be of significant help in your genealogical searches for missing data. You can easily make a list of all the people in your database who are missing birth dates, or death dates, or.....

One of the major advantages of selecting a popular computer program is that there are many auxiliary programs developed by individuals to enhance the capabilities of the original program. One such program available for PAF is PAFAbility. This program was written by Barbara A. Bennett, 6426 Pound Apple Court, Columbia, MD 21045 and is available as Shareware. Shareware is a designation given to programs that are available to be used to ascertain their usefulness to you prior to purchase. Generally these type of programs are written by a person actively engaged in the specific activity for which the program was designed.

DID YOU KNOW ····

Alvaro Siza, a practicing architect for thirty-eight years in Porto, Fortugal was awarded the Nobel Prize for Architecture, the profession's highest honor amounting to \$100,000. The prize was awarded to him in Chicago, May 14, 1992.

His Meteorological Central was constructed for the Olympic Village in Barcelona, Spain.

One of his early projects was a complex in Leca de Parmeira, completed in 1966, that included two swimming pools (one for adults, one for children) and a building with changing rooms and a cafe. Both the pools and the buildings are set into ratural rock formations on the site with unobstructed view of the sea.

He also built a pavillion for the School of Architecture at Porto University and a library for Averio University in Portugal.

Mr. Siza has been at work on the Museum of Contemporary Art in Galicia in Santiago, Spain and a Modern Art Museum for Porto.



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LUIZA ROSA de AGUILLAR TODI

This Fortuguese mezzo-soprano was born in Sebutal January 9, 1753 and died in Lisbon October 1, 1833.

She made her debut as a comic actress at age fourteen, married the violinist Francisco Todi at sixteen, studied singing with David Perez.

She made her opera debut 1770 in Scolari's II Viaggiatore ridicolo, made appearances in London (1772 and 1777-78), Madrid (1777), Paris (1778-79 and 1781-82), and Berlin (1782).

In 1783, her rivalry with Elizabeth Mara became a sensation in musical Paris, two hostile factions being formed, the Todistes and the Maratistes.

In 1784 she went to Russia, where she obtained considerable success at the court of Catherine the Great; in 1787 Friedrich Wilhelm II engaged her at a high salary in Berlin; in 1789 she sang again in Paris; in 1793 she returned to Portugal; during the last years of her life she was completely blind.
