



JOSEPH PALMER SYLVIA

ca 1792-1862

A three-hour ferry ride from the seaport of New Bedford to the island of Nantucket off the southeast coast of Massachusetts will transport one within walking distance of the Whaling Museum where one will find what appears to be the earliest piece of dated scrimshaw, a whale's tooth identified and dated.

Etched in clear 'old-fashioned script:

"This is a tooth of the last whale Killed by Joseph P. Sylvia In the Ship Rambler In the year of 1821 Capt. Benjamin Worth, Master,"

The treasure 7 1/2 incles long, 8 inches maximum circumference and 2 inches maximum thickness, was donated in 1958 by Miss Mildred Howland Brooks, the granddaughter of Joseph Palmer Sylvia.

One may also view the oil portrait of Mr. Sylvia, son of Joseph and Mary Sylvia, born ca1792 on the island of Fayal, Azores where it was common practice for young aspirants intent on emigrating to American shores, to slip away on whaling vessels anchored at Horta, Fayal where ships took on supplies and augmented their crew members.

Mr. Sylvia's last voyage was on the Ship Rambler which sailed out of the port Nantucket November 21, 1818 and eventually headed for the whaling grounds in the Pacific returning to port October 31, 1821 with 1,890 barrels of sperm oil.

The island became Mr. Sylvia's second home where he retired as a farmer. Sherbourne, Nantucket had advanced rapidly to the front ranking among whaling and had by 1820 made a small shipment of oil to London.

Mr. Sylvia married the widow Mary Lyon, daughter of Seth Russell and Abigail Meader. The marriage took place November 17, 1822. From this issue four children were born: Rebecca, Joseph, Elizabeth, married to J. T. Silvia and Delphina married to John P. Taber.

Following the death of his wife who died of dropsy in 1846, Mr. Sylvia ventured into a second marriage with Mary Fuller, daughter of John and Elizabeth Barber. The offspring of this union included Ferdinand, Ella, Emma T., and Josephine who married Charles Brooks, parents of Miss Mildred Howland Brooks, the donor of the celebrated whale's tooth.

Miss Brooks died in Belmont, Massachusetts at the age of 88. The retired secretary was interred in the family plot at Prospect Hill Cemetery, Nantucket.

SURNAME ORIGINS

Whatever the surname found in the Azores, it is possible to discover who brought that name to the islands. That person is called the "trunk" for that name.

To learn your connection to a particular surname, it is necessary to use a combination of the church records and history books. If the church records are not old enough for your village, you may be out of luck on that branch of ancestry, unless your recent ancestors are listed in the history books. All of the leading noble families in the islands are listed, of course.

It takes quite a bit of digging in the church records and in historu books before one can make a connection to those noble families.

If your ancestors are from Faial, Pico, Sao Jorge or Flores, you will run across names like Silveira, Pereira, Machado, Vieira, Dutra, Terra, etc. and claim them as your own as you trace your ancestors. In the majority of cases, each surname will have what I call a "home region".

The Dutra surname, for instance, is peculiar to the Azores. The name was established there when the Flemish nobleman, Joos van Huerter, a native of Bruges, Flanders (part of present-day Belgium), became the first *Capitao Donatario* of the islands of Faial and Pico in 1468. His name was transliterated to d'Utra and then to Dutra, though one finds both spellings in the old records.

All people with that name are descendants, or of his brothers and sisters, though one may not be able to know the exact connection. It depends on the available church records for the village in question.

Joos van Huerter (aka Joz d'Utra) settled in Faial. The leading families there intermarried, and some settled on Pico, which was under the same jurisdiction as Faial. So, Faial and Pico are the "home region" for the name Dutra.

Another name found in the Azores is Sodre, and springs from John de Sudeley of England, who went to Portugal in 1386 as secretary to Philippa of Lancaster, who became queen of Portugal when she married King John I.

The surname Sudeley was transliterated to Sodre (spelled Xodre in most old documents), a name which didn't exist until Sudeley entered Portugal. There is no question, then, that all people named Sodre are the descendants of Sudeley. The LDS Ancestral File reveals that John de Sudeley is a direct descendant of King Henry I of England (1070-1135), who was himself a descendant of William the Conqueror, Charlemagne, the Anjou Kings of France, 8. and all the Frankish kings of the first century.

Sudeley was the second great-grandfather of Izabel Vaz, who was married to Rodrigo Alvares or Alves, who established the village of Sao Roque do Pico in the I500s. As for Izabel Vaz's Portuguese ancestors, the famous explorer Vasco da Gama was her first cousin, once removed. Her grandfather, Pedro Correia da Cunha, was the first *Capitao Donatario* (military governor/absolute ruler) of Graciosa. His wife was Izeu Perestrello de Mendonca, daughter of Bartholomeu Perestrello, the first *Capitao Donatario* of Porto Santo, Madeira, and a half-sister of Filipa Moniz, who married Christopher Columbus.

Silveira is so common on Faial, Flores, Corvo, Pico and Sao Jorge islands because of Willem van der Hagen, also a native of Bruges, known to most Azoreans by his translated Portuguese name of Guilherme da Silveira. He brought the first settlers to Faial, later took some to Flores, made his residence on Terceira, and finally died at an advanced age in the first decade of the l6th century in his home in Topo, Sao Jorge.

His children married into all the other leading families, and his grandchildren continued to use the name Silveira in his honor, even though their fathers had some other surnames. Thus was the Silveira name perpetuated. It can be assumed that most people in the Azores with the name Silveira descend from Van der Hagen - probably more than a million people cover the centuries.

Sometimes you can't tell which famous ancestor is being honored by taking his name, as in the case of Maria Silveira Vilalobos, the third wife of capitao Domingos Vieira Serpa, married in Ribeiras, Pico in 1699. Her parents were Manoel da Costa de Sao Joao and Izabel d'Azevedo. Which ancestor named Silveira Vilalobos was she honoring? The first capitao-mor of Faial, Diogo Gomes da Silveira, grandson of Van der Hagen, had a son who used the name Francisco da Silveira Villa Lobos, who married into the Furtado de Mendonca family. Some sources mention the ancestry of the Vilalobos surname in the mainland.

The surname Terra comes from Josse van Aertrijcke (aka Jorge da Terra)., another Flemish nobleman, who was among the first settlers of Faial. He married Margarida da Silveira, daughter of Van der Hagen. Jorge da Terra's third son used the name of Joz da Terra da Silveira, and the latter's eldest son married Izabel Pereira Goulart. A daughter of Joz da Terra da Silveira married Antonio de Brum da Silveira Leite. Other descendants used the names Montojos, Pimentel, Rodrigues, Bettencourt and many more.

Terra leads us also to Peixoto, through Maria da Terra (whose connection to the above Jorge da Terra is still unknown) who married *capitao* Francisco Peixoto da Silveira, born in Santo Amaro, Pico about 1602. The children and grandchildren of Antonio de Brum da Silveira, another descendant APGHS Newsletter, Vol. XVII, No. 1. (1996) 9.

of Van der Hagen, and his wife Brites Evangelho (a noble family of Terceira), used the names Peixoto, Peixoto da Silveira and Silveira Peixoto. Could the above *capitao* Peixoto da Silveira connect here?

Clara Maria Silveira born April 28, 1707

She was married July 3, 1727 to Matteus da Cunha Toste of Velos, S. Jorge.

Steven Silvia of California writes us, "I managed to put together for one of my clients, her ancestor Clara Maria da Silveira listed in 'Familias Faialenses' and was able to trace her back to four founders of the Azores all of them Flemish noblemen!----Possibly there are others who have traced as far back as Clara Maria, or one of her ancestors. I'm sure they'd be thrilled to see the continuation of their lines back to these distinguished gentlemen."

Her father, Antonio Furtado Mendonca, born October 10, 1685, married Luizia Clara Silveira, July 11, 1759.

His mother, Maria Pereira Bulcao, married Jorge Furtado Mendonca, who was born April 28, 1643.

Maria Pereira Bulcao's father was Manuel Rodrigues Souto, married Margarida Pereira who passed away May 18, 1650.

Margarida Pereira's father was Manuel Pereira Bulcao, married to Isabel d'Andrade.

Isabel d'Andrade's mother was Maria Leal Pereira; whose father was Francisco Pereira Sarmento.

Francisco Pereira Sarmento's paternal grandfather was <u>Jorge da Terra</u>, Flemish nobleman and paternal grandmother was Margarida da Silveira, (also mentioned in the previous article) daughter of <u>Willelm Van der Hagen</u> and Margarida Van Savoia.

Going back to Manuel Pereira Bulcao, his father was Antonio d'Utra da Silveria Bulcao.

Antonio's father was Jeronimo d'Utra Bulcao whose father was <u>Gaspar Silveira Bulcao</u>, Flemish nobleman and first recorded Bulcao on Faial and married to Violante d'Utra.

Viotante's father was Antonio d'Utra Nunes whose mother was Josina or Jorgina d'Utra a sister of Jose D'utra, first captain of Faial. <u>Josina's father was Leo Van Heurtere</u>, a Flemish Lord.

Again going back to Manuel Pereira Bulcao whose father was Antonio d'Utra da Silveria Bulcao and whose paternal grandfather was Jeronimo d'Utra IO. APGHS Newsletter, Vol. XVII, No.1. (1996)

Bulcao married to Margarida da Silveira; her mother being Anna da Silveira.

Anna da Silveira's father was Diogo Gomes of Graciosa. Her mother was Catharina da Silveira, ca1568 and daughter of Jorge da Terra the Flemish nobleman.

Please note that there are two Margarida da Silveiras here; one the daughter of Willhelm Van der Hagen and the other the daughter of Anna da Silveira and the maternal granddaughter of Catherina da Silveira, daughter of Jorge da Terra.

Social Security Records

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The above is a sample of what one receives when applying for Social Security information on Form No. SSA-L997.

So many of our members have ancestors with only the information that they came from the Azores or Portugal. This form does begin to help them.

Line 5 gives his age as 73 when he applied for Social Security benefits which is listed on the left side below as being December 8, 1939. Line 5 also gives his birthdate as November 23, I866 and that he came from St. Miguel, Azores Islands. The next line gives his father as Leon Alexander Almeida, his APGHS Newsletter, Vol. XVII, No. 1. (1996)

mother as Anna Lucia.

The above information was submitted by Alfred L. Dyott of Massachusetts.

Some records might be more specific. What is actually needed before beginning research in the Islands, is the name of the town or freguesia.

However even with this scarce information, one can begin researching. If other documents do not give the needed information, one can search the Mormon records for the Island. Of course it is a long tedious bit of work, requiring much patience. As for St. Miguel, there are over one hundred parishes to search. At least the time frame is lowered. But we usually find it is all worth the effort.

St. Michael is by far the Island with the most parishes. Most of the other Islands have twenty or forty or whatever to search.

We find that Social Security Death Benefit Records, 1937-1991 are available on CD #IIO at \$39.99, plus postage and handling from Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1001 N. Calvert St., Baltimore, MD 21202-3897.

And while we are on the subject of researching.....

A Brief History of the Portuguese People in Lawrence, MA from 1853 to World War II.

Continued from, the Fall, 1995 Issue.....

Children of early immigrants attended the Amesbury Street School and parents learned English from them. Primarily of Roman Catholic faith, they were communicants at St. Mary's Church. During the late I800's we wonder where they celebrated their feasts which were so great a part of their life. We know that they paraded the cattle bedecked in ribbons down Common Street prior to preparation for the great meal on the feast day of the Holy Ghost. We wonder whether this meal took place on the third story of a tenement building on Common Street - in a hall which was much later used by the Civic League.

The Portuguese woman and mother played a major role because life evolved around the family. As customary, she stayed at home to rear the children, yet was a significant factor in contributing to the economy of the household. Dressmakers were in high demand as the young immigrant girls earned their first pay envelopes. Other women, who specialized in making certain foods - - linguica, chorica or sweetbread, supplied the early grocers with product and also took weekly orders from relatives and friends for the same. My grandmother ran a boarding house on the site of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Building on Common Street shortly after the turn of the century. This was her contribution to the household's economy. She provided hearty meals for the immigrants who resided in rooming houses. Portuguese women had a passion for growing flowers both inside and outside the home. It was a APHGS Newsletter, Vol. XVII, No. 1. (1996)

common sight to see a struggling orange tree inside the home, a gift from a relative in California.

Wherever there was a small patch of dirt, the Portuguese could make two blades of grass grow where there had only been one. But the Portuguese were interested mainly in the edible varities of landscaping. Small gardens were crowded in behind tenements, on roof tops and window sills. Fava beans, peppers and tomatoes grew alongside roses and hydrangeas. And of course, there was the ever present grape arbor which covered the walkway. The Portuguese have a penchant for wine and they soon found that elderberries and concord grapes grew profusely along the country roads of Methuen and North Andover. The Portuguese liked other spirits as well. In the community was a coppersmith, who shall remain nameless, and who fashioned paraphernalia which was in particularly high demand during the prohibition.

Towards the end of the nineteenth century began a period of belonging and joining, but mainly to Portuguese organizations. St. Anthony's Benevolent Society had been incorporated in Lowell in 1895. And Mr. Alvaro Gaiolas, prominent in the Portuguese community, founded the Lawrence Agency in 1903. In 1905, Father James T. O'Reilley, sensing the need for a church, gathered the Portuguese people to worship in the old St. Mary's Church. Plans were made and the cornerstone of the new Church was laid one year later in 1906. The trowel used in this ceremony is on display in the exhibit, compliments of one of our elders, Mr. Jeffrey Vasconcelos. In 1907, the Church was dedicated by William Cardinal O'Connell of Boston. Since the parishioners could not agree on a name, Father O'Reilley chose the name St. Peter and Paul. It is located on Chestnut St. and you will find that it is one of the best kept secrets in the City of Lawrence.

After the Portuguese people had a church of their own, they embarked on a round of fund raising events to furnish the Church and to raise money for the celebration of their religious feasts. The Sears Brothers Orchestra, a Portuguese family of talented musicians, performed at dances, minstrel shows and numerous events. We shall never forget Johnny Sears' imitation of Groucho Marx while singing, "Yes, we have no bananas". Later the Manny Sousa Orchestra members were featured performers.

In 1915, "The Light of the World Benevolent Society" was founded in Lawrence. Most of our grandfathers and fathers were founding members. Like a fraternal organization, they dressed in fancy ceremonial uniforms, complete with a sword. By the 1940's, it had outlived its usefulness and was dissolved by Mr. Vasconcelos.

KALAUPAPA: PALI TRAIL

The Kalaupapa Trail was cut out into the face of a 1,600 foot cliff in 1886 by Manual Joao Farinha, an immigrant from the isle of Madeira. The Moolokai Visitors Association said that Farinha apparently followed a foot trail used by the ancient Hawaiians. Have any of you seen how steep the trail is? It is most challenging to walk on the trail, and the mules that take visitors to Kalaupapa are so unique, they know just how to take step by step down the hill. Major renovations have been done, steel reinforcing bars were put in, concrete blocks and new drains installed and parts of the trail were filled with gravel. The trail now has a smooth surface and steps no higher than nine inches, it's now ready for another decade of use.


Annual Meeting

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
