Azorean Ancestors: Making the Connection

The population of the Azores has seldom exceeded 300,000. About half live on fifty-mile long, twelve-mile wide São Miguel; the other half on the remaining eight islands. Even today, most live in or near the villages where the family has lived for generations. Most Azoreans descend from some, if not many, of the pioneers who arrived after the archipelago's discovery in 1444.

Finding a genealogical link to those ancestors can sometimes be a relatively simple task and requires only finding previously documented genealogies, but some vital records have been lost or have succumbed to the damp climate, floods, moths, mice or aging decay, making the link a daunting task.

This is the first of a series on the founding Azorean patriarchs and parishes where their descendants are prominently represented with reference to further genealogical sleuthing.

Rui Vaz Medeiros

came to São Miguel in 1474 from Madeira with Rui Gonsalves da Câmara, the island's third Captain Donatary. Historical records indicate he had fled there from Vasco de Medeiros, 1 his father, in Ponte de Lima, mainland Portugal. On Madeira he had married Ana Gonsalves de Mendonça, daughter of Jorge de Mendonça, who Frutuoso says was "of the noble Furtado Mendonças." 2 Rui and Ana 's eldest son estabished an entailed estate at Tabua.3

On São Miguel, the Captain Donatary granted Medeiros many lands in the Lagoa area for development.⁴ He and Ana established an entailed estate, an accounting of which was given by a grandson in 1559. After her death he moved to Ponta Garça and lived next to the chapel of Nossa Senhora da Esperança (Our Lady of Good Hope), which he had built and given to the settlement. He divided his property among his ten children and went on the pilgrimage to the Holy Land with the hope of spending his last days in penitential poverty and humility. The wish was unfulfilled because the Ottoman Turks refused him the safe conduct pass of a Christian pilgrim.⁵ In his undated will there is mention of his father-in-law, João do Porto, so he must have remarried.

His many children assured the succession of numerous descendants throughout São Miguel and his name and blood are represented in the nobility and peasantry of the island. The Houses of Praia e Monforte and Laranjeiras claim him as an ancestor.

His descendants are concentrated in Gintes, Lagoa, Povoação and Vila Franca. The following works contain much information about his descendants: Genealogias de S. Miguel e S. Maria, Rodrigio Rodrigues, Vol. I, Chapter 19; Genealogias, Carlos Machado, pp. 271 & 404; Familias Antigas da Povoação, Câmara Municipal da Povoação, pp. 68-74; Apontamentos Histórico-Genealógicos Sobre a Familia Borges-Coutinho de Medeiros e Dias, Condes-Viscondes da Praia, Viscondes de Monforte, António Borges Coutinho Sousa Dias da Câmara. The noted Azorean genealogist, Dr. José de Almeida Mello, is researching Rui Vaz de Medeiros and his descendants.

ORIGINS

The family's origins are disputed. Some suggest that Rui's ancestors took the family name from Medeiros in the parish of Vila Chã in the District of Montalegre in Vila Real. The first known of the name is Rui Gonsalves de Medeiros who lived in Évora during the reign of D. João I of Avis (1385-1433). His reward for helping the king take Évora Castle was to be named a castellan. He was a descendant of Martim Sanches de Medas, from who some genealogists claim the name Medeiros comes. Martim was a contemporary of D. Afonso III, Portugal's first king, and had taken part on the Battle of Porto in 1245. He married D. Dórdia Nunes de Aguiar, the daughter of Nuno Martins de Aguiar, a descendant of D. Arnaldo de Bayam and thus from the line of Charlemagne. D. Dórdia's mother was D. Teresa Afonso, a granddaughter of the aforementioned first king. Except for Nobiliário de Familias Portuguesas, all genealogists and histories agree on the latter point.6

Ancestry

Beatriz Pires Delgado of the Delgados of Caniço and Ponta do Sol, wife of Fernão Affonso Paiva, o ruivo (the redhead)

"Fernão Affonso de Paiva, whose real name was Fernão de Paiva, was a native of Vouzela on the outskirts of Vizeu. He came to this island [Madeira] at the time of Captain João Roiz da Câmara ..."8 Having been orphaned while still a minor, he had lived in the home of his brother, Pedro, a rich and noble man who owned vast lands and herds of sheep and goats. A neighbor nobleman hunted in their fields and often stole Pedro's animals. Fernão confronted him and knocked him off his horse. Three days later the nobleman-thief died from his injuries.

Well provided by Pedro, Fernão was sent to safety in Madeira where he married Beatriz, "sister of Pero Delgado, kin to the Delgados of Ponta do Sol and Caniço." The family of the murdered man learned of Fernão's whereabouts so he fled again—this time to São Miguel. On "Ilha Verde" (Green Island) he settled in Ribeira Grande, where he bought vast lands.

The Delgados descend from Pedro Delgado, nicknamed "o Nabo" (the turnip), who was married to Isabel Fernandes, nicknamed "a Velha da Serra" (the Old Lady of the Mountain), both of noble families and natives of Arruda. Pedro Delgado was the brother of Lopo Vaz Delgado, another early settler. Isabel was the daughter of Fernão Nunes Cardoso and Catarina Gouveia, grand-daughter of Nuno Fernandes Cardoso, a descendant of D. Pedro the Cruel and D. Inês de Castro, according to various genealogists. According to historical evidence, Pedro and Isabel were among Madeira's first settlers. Frutuoso writes they had lands in Ponta do Sol and Lombo das Adegas.¹¹ Both had arrived in São Miguel in 1497 with João Rodrigues, the fourth Captain Donatary. While many, if not all, of their children might have been born and married on Madeira, the youngest came with them to São Miguel as infants.

The Galvãos

The Tavares Mirandas were absent from Bretanha for nearly a century from the death of Luis Tavares Mianda in 1784. In 1865 fifteen year-old Filomena Galvão of Ribeira Grande, the grand-daughter of José Bento Miranda, a great-grandson of Margarida Francisca Miranda, married Manuel Carvalho dos Reis of Bretanha and returned with him to his village. ¹² His parents were first cousins, both grandchildren of Manuel de Medeiros Galvão and Maria Rosa de Medeiros. Both traced their lineage to Pedro Vieira, the illegitimate son of Duarte Galvão. ¹³ Born in Évora in 1438, Duarte Galvão was a statesman, diplomat and chronicler during the reigns of Afonso V, João II and Manuel I. He was the governor of Leiria Castle before ambassador appointments to the Courts Pope Alexander VI, Holy Roman Emperor Maximillian II and Louis XII of France. D. Manuel I named him ambassador to the Court of Abyssinia, but he died on 9 June 1517 before fulfilling the office. The Galvãos traced their lineage back to Lopo Afonso da Costa, João Galvao and Gonçalo Vasques da Silveira, who died in 1320.¹⁴

Frutuoso writes that Pedro Vieira, who had married against his father's wishes, came to São Miguel with his wife in the early days of colonization, but does not identify her. During the war betwen Spain and Portugal Afonso V sent him as his representative to the Spanish Court. Frutuoso refers to him as a very noble and learned man and records he returned to the mainland where he died among his people. His son, Fernão Vieira, established himself in Lagoa.

Most of Filomena Galvão's descendants emigrated to the United States. Beginning on page 326 in Carlos Machado's *Genealogias*, the family ancestry can be back traced. A copy is at the APGHS collection in the Taunton Public Library.


Messages


